2.1.1 Child Guidance Clinic:

This Clinic caters to the children below the age of 18 years suffering from childhood mental health problems. During the report year, the Child Guidance Clinic OPD Services were extended to 6 days per week. Total attendance of patients during the year 2018-19 is shown in the Table given above.

2.1.2 Adult Psychiatry OPD:

The Adult Psychiatry OPD is open on weekdays from 9 am to 5 pm. Monthly attendance of patients in the Adult OPD Clinic is shown in the Table.

2.1.3 Chemical Dependency OPD:

Clients dependent on various kinds of addictive substances attend this clinic for counseling and admission to the Indoor Chemical Dependency Ward.

2.1.4 General Medical OPD:

Patients from far and near including psychiatric patients and their relatives suffering from various general (non-psychiatric) illnesses attend this clinic that is open on Mondays to Saturdays. However, the Executive Committee has decided to discontinue the General Medical OPD except for arrangements to attend to emergency medical needs of Psychiatric patients attending OPD and patients admitted to various wards.

2.1.5 Local Health Improvement Scheme:

This Scheme covers patients from Below Poverty Line Families in the villages around Antaragram. There are 235 persons covered under this Scheme. They receive medical consultation and medicines on payment of nominal charges per visit.

2.1.6 Counseling & Guidance Clinic:

Clients requiring psychological counseling on an outpatient basis, attend this clinic. Individual Counseling, Family Counseling, IQ Tests, Relaxation Therapy, Cognitive Behavior Therapy and various other psychological interventions are extended from this Clinic.

2.1.7 Dispensary:

The Dispensary at Antaragram OPD distributes mainly psychiatric drugs and a few General Medical drugs. The medicines are distributed at lower rates than MRP. Needy patients receive free/subsidized treatment and medicines through the OPD.

2.1.8 Pathology Sample Collection Centre:

Antara has made an arrangement with an external Diagnostic Laboratory for conducting pathology tests and investigations for the patients being treated at Antara. Pathology Samples are collected at Antara and sent to their Laboratory for necessary tests. This arrangement provides adequate support in the diagnosis and treatment of the hundreds of patients who come to Antara Out Patient Clinic regularly.

2.2 SATELLITE CLINICS

It was found from Antara's experience in treating patients for the past several years that the distance and expenses incurred on transportation are causing a number of patients to drop out from follow-up treatment. Therefore, it was decided to reach out to the patients through Satellite Clinics.

2.2.1 Janata Medical Service (Mar Thoma Church):

This Joint Project of Antara and Janata Medical Service of the Mar Thoma Church, Kolkata has been serving hundreds of psychiatric patients twice weekly on Tuesdays and Fridays since 1971. During the year 22 New Patients and 2021 Follow-up Patients attended the clinic. Antara is grateful to Janata Medical Service and the Mar Thoma Church for the support extended by them in this joint venture. Currently, the services of Clinical Psychologist are also made available through this Clinic.

2.2.2 Nabojibon (Missionaries of Charity Centre – Noorpur):

The Clinic is open every alternate Tuesday. During the year 80 New Patients and 2400 Follow-up Patients attended the clinic. The psychiatric medical Team from Antara uses the Ambulance donated by Indian Oil Corporation Ltd. to reach these Satellite Clinics. The psychiatric team from Antara also examines the destitute psychiatric patients accommodated and looked after by the Missionaries of Charity (Brothers) at the Nabojibon Centre.

2.2.3 St. Gabriel's Boys' Hostel (CNI Church – Port Canning):

Another Satellite Clinic functions at the St. Gabriel's Boys Hostel Premises of the CNI Church at Canning on every alternate Tuesday. During the year 36 New Patients and 1173 Follow-up Patients attended the clinic.

2.2.4 Antara White Cross Bari (Gazipur):

From 3rd June, 2006 a Psychiatric OPD Clinic is functioning at this Centre. Currently about 26 patients attend this Clinic on alternate Thursdays. During the year 15 New Patients and 828 Follow-up Patients attended the clinic.

4. REHABILITATION PROGRAMMES

4.1 RESIDENTIAL WARDS:

Patients requiring long periods of stay for rehabilitation are accommodated in the Rehabilitation wards for Men (30 beds) and Women (18 beds).

4.2 ANTARA GROUP HOMES:

Two model Homes are maintained at Antaragram accommodating 28 Residents in the Group Home for Women and 24 Residents in the Group Home for Men.

4.3. ANTARA GAZIPUR CENTRE -

Out Patient treatment is provided from this centre to Psychiatric Patients from the nearby villages.

4.4. NON-RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMMES:

4.4.1. Personal Growth & Development Unit: (Day Treatment Unit)

Currently, 39 patients are participating in this programme. Most of these patients stay at their homes and attend the Programme from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Some of the patients attend the programme from the Indoor Hospital Wards and Group Homes.

Individual counseling, Group Counseling, Family Counseling & Education, Group Activities like Drama, Mime, Discussions, Debates, Cultural Programmes, and Social Outings etc: are arranged for the patients attending this Unit.

4.4.2. Occupational Therapy Programmes:

Various Occupational Therapy programmes provide opportunities to resident and non-resident clients to improve their mental status, inter-personal relationships and skill training.

5. TRAINING & ORIENTATION PROGRAMMES

5.1. Vocational Training Programmes:

This Unit is mainly meant for imparting computer and Information Technology Training to the recovering psychiatric patients and Chemical Dependency Patients. External students from the local community as well as the staff of Antara are also imparted training at this Unit. In addition to the Computer Training Programme, ANTARA offers Vocational Training in Tailoring & Handicrafts-making.

5.2. Library & Reading Room:

More books on mental health, addiction, Psychiatry, Psychology, Social Work, Nursing and related topics have been added. Antara staff, patients, trainees and students placed at Antara from various Institutions are increasingly utilizing the library facilities.

Description Of Community Mental Health Unit

The arrays of Community mental health services vary depending on the country through which the services are provided. It refers to a system of care in which the patient's community, not a specific facility such as hospital, is the primary provider of care for people with mental illness. The goal of community mental health services often includes much more than simply providing outpatient psychiatric treatment.

Antara Community Mental Health Unit is pursuing the following objectives on the way to meet its vision regarding Mental illness.

- > To create mass awareness about the causes ,mal effects, preventive measures and detection process of Mental illness.
- > To create sensitization among the schools, college, students, teenagers and youths, adults regarding healthy lifestyle and healthy minds to prevent mental illness.
- > To ensure professional advocacy for influencing policy regarding proper and affordable care and treatment process of Mental illness affected population especially for poor and marginalized section.
- To identify the mentally ill affected people and their families and help them towards psycho-social adjustment with the ill effects of mental illness.

Antara Community mental health unit has been able to organize Awareness Generation so far to create wide mass awareness and community sensitization about facts and myths related to mental illness, healthy lifestyle to prevent mental illness, the importance of early detection and treatment, signs and symptoms of mental illness etc.

The key components of Community mental Health services:

Public Awareness generation programme: To organize awareness programme for patients and family as well as community.

Early Detection & Treatment: To identify problems and diagnosis the need of mentally ill patients in Community as a whole.

Training: Imparting short term training for the health workers and other nodal staffs of the local agencies /institution.

Psychosocial rehabilitation: to assist people who have major psychiatric disabilities. The focus is to improve a person's connections and participation within their community.

To conduct the School Mental Health Programme for the mental illness.

Mental Health Mass Awareness Programme sponsored by BFIL (Bharat Financial Inclusion Limited):

Objective: The main objective of the project is to develop and evaluate a mode of mental illness prevention, promotion and rehabilitation programme suitable for rural, semi—urban areas in West Bengal.

The Main Components of the Project are:

- 1. Orientation & Training Programme of ASHA / Anganwadi Workers & Volunteers.
- 2. Community Awareness Generation Activities.
- 3. School Mental Health Programmes

Detailed objectives:

To implement a comprehensive model of awareness and community –

To ensure evidence based intervention process that will be useful to West Bengal .

To develop tools and materials for mental health promotion and mental illness prevention such as information brochure, visual aids, training aids etc.In the beginning 30 Gram Panchayats/and three Corporation Wards will be selected to conduct awareness and sensitization campaign against Mental Illness. Sensitization and awareness will be created about how to avoid stigma, addiction and adopt healthy life style to prevent mental illness. This will be achieved through TOT (Training of Trainers) of grass root level workers like ASHA, Anganwadi & Volunteers under this programme.

Training of Trainers: It is the Process to give new trainers the background knowledge, skills and practical experience to provide communities with basic knowledge and awareness on mental health.



Observation & Analysis after ToT

These are few questions are required from the community volunteers

For examples:

- 1. How many cases are intervened?
- 2. How many cases referred by Community volunteers?
- 3. How many cases of mental illness?
- 4. How many cases of Child, adult, addiction & new & old cases are identified?
- 5. How many Awareness programme conducted by Community Volunteers?
- 6. Do you feel, people are talking freely about mental health? Y/N
- 7. How many cases they have in a regular contact?


In this seminar we focussed on psychological problems of children those are identified by community volunteers. So during interactive session raised lots of problems related to child those are suffering from mental illness. For example:

- 1. The child name is Shima. He is 8 years old. He has problem in drooling and self laughing. He is going to school but the family members are concerned regarding that problems & they anxious how their child will be treated?
- 2. A 3 years old child has lack of age appropriate communication and delay in walking. He is getting treatment from PG hospital. But still he has so far shown no improvement.
- 3. Child has empathy towards understanding of in any activities. He has problem in learning and doing any kind of work. He does not go to school. The parents have no idea about treatment.
- 4. The 10 years old child talks very irrelevant, forgetfulness in study, pain in headache, he was getting treatment from Antara. But he is now stopped medicine and problems are raised.
- 5. 11 years old child cannot talk properly, level of understanding low, cannot walk, he has self muttering.
- 6. 13 years old child has forgetfulness, phobia in study and incessant all time crying tendency.
- 7. 11 years old child has epileptic disorder, forgetfulness, not interest in study and seizure.
- 8. Purnima Halder is 4 years old child. She has speech problem and still she is not admitted in school. Parents seeking remedy.
- 9. Shila is 14 years old child. She has communication problem. She likes to stay alone. She does not interact with others. Shows delay in response to questions.
- 10. Rohit is a 5 years old. He has self muttering and he has tendency to withdrawn from society.

KNOWLEDGE:

On survey regarding basic concept of mental illness, we found out that most of the Community Volunteers or Community People have a satisfactory grasp on the concept of mental illness - Very good, good 66%, more or less satisfactory 12%, very little 6%.

SIGN & SYMPTOMS:

We organized an interactive session with the Community Volunteers on the subject of signs & symptoms on mental health. The data gathered from the session is summarized below: Very good 17.43%, good 33%, very little 19%, few 50, none 2.75%.


<u>ATTITUDE</u>

We formulated and distributed a pamphlet in which we analyzed the concept of mental health and its acceptance in questionnaire form amongst the Community People and in the Community Volunteers. The result of the analysis can be summarized as: People talk freely 91%, refer to mental health facility 95%, will refer to faith healer 4.5%.

PRACTICE

Community Volunteers and ASHA workers are referring patients to Government and Private Clinics. Steps have been implemented through their help and doctors' advice on effective patient followup. Panchayet Pradhans also are much more involved in patient referral and conducting awareness programs. Community volunteers are likewise doing more programs in their respective localities
